# Non-desexed cat and dog fees

Pet owners can use this form to pay an **additional fee** or **annual permit fee** for non-desexed pets, as required under the *Companion Animals Act 1998*.

Owners of non-desexed cats over 4 months of age must pay an annual permit fee (cats born before 22 July 2020 are exempt). Owners of non-desexed dogs over 6 months of age must pay a once-only additional fee.

You must be over 18 years of age to legally own a cat or dog in NSW.

This form does not register a pet – give council a completed Pet registration (R2) form and pay the fee to officially register your pet.

Talk to your veterinarian about desexing options and what's best for your pet. Desexing cats and dogs is not mandatory in NSW, but it often has health and behavioural benefits.

## Information for cat owners

If your cat is not desexed by 4 months of age, you must pay an annual permit fee (cats born before 22 July 2020 are exempt). You must pay this at the same time every year until you get your cat desexed or a veterinarian grants your cat a desexing exemption.

If you buy or adopt a non-desexed cat over 4 months of age, you have 2 months before you must pay the annual permit fee. You can get the cat desexed by a veterinarian in this time to avoid paying the annual permit fee.

# Information for dog owners

If your dog is not desexed by 6 months of age, you must pay an additional fee. This is a once-only fee and it's due as soon as your dog is 6 months old.

# Desexing exemptions

A veterinarian can recommend a temporary or permanent desexing exemption for medical reasons. They can update the desex status online or provide you with a Certificate of Desexing for you to give to your local council.
